Iatrogenic lymphocytopenia is caused by cytotoxic chemotherapy, radiation therapy, or the administration of antilymphocyte globulin (or other lymphocyte antibodies). Long-term treatment for psoriasis using psoralen and ultraviolet A irradiation may destroy T cells. Long-term glucocorticoid therapy can induce lymphocyte destruction.

Lymphocytopenia: Causes, Symptoms, and Treatment

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The mean initial dose of oral corticosteroids was 0.9±0.4 mg/kg. Additional initial immunosuppressive therapy consisted of pulse methylprednisolone (59%), cyclophosphamide (86%), methotrexate (6%), azathioprine (1%), and plasmapheresis (25%). Six percent received oral corticosteroids only.

Lymphocytopenia, or lymphopenia (absolute total blood lymphocyte count <1500/ μ L), is one of the hallmarks of the primary and acquired immunodeficiency syndromes (AIDS) (see Chapter 56).It also occurs in a wide variety of conditions, such as aplastic anemia, tuberculosis, zinc deficiency, systemic lupus erythematosus, sarcoidosis, Hodgkin lymphoma (HL), toxic shock, and renal failure (Box 57.1).

As lymphopenia is a chemotherapy or radiation related hematological side effect, the treatment with iv vitamin C is covered by the approved indication. The study included 48 cancer patients (aged \geq 18 years) with lymphopenia, defined as a TLC below 1500/ μ L blood [2, 34].
